The Season in Review

Planting was delayed this year, as winter just didn't know when to quit. Our foreign workers arrived in mid-April, which gave us time to prepare equipment until planting began in early May. We added a second planter, to plant soybeans in narrower rows to help reduce seed costs. We also updated combines, trading our 2 JD \$680's for 2 Claas 760TT's, which is a bit of a color change for us.

This off season we attended our MD (management development) peer group in December. We met in Yuma, Arizona where we visited Four Little Devils Farms which mainly grows vegetables. We enjoyed the opportunity to reconnect with others from the group, share experiences and complete some additional training. In March, the group met at the Family Farms headquarters in Brighton, Illinois. This session had more of a financial emphasis to it. We had a great time visiting with our group peers, while continuing our education.

In March and April, Lisa had the opportunity to participate in "Annie's Project". Annie's Project is a six-session weekly meeting of farm management programs for women, designed to empower them to be better business partners on farms or ranches.

center for the summer and has one more semester to complete his Crop and Weed Science degree at NDSU. He will graduate this December. Jakob works part-time on campus in the Barley Breeding Research Center. He also lends a hand on the farm whenever he can.

Landowner Spotlight

Leona V. Neu was born, twelve miles east of Ashley on May 7, 1925 to Jacob and Marie Woeszner. She attended country school until age thirteen, graduation, she worked on the family farm and babysat for neighborhood families.

On October 29, 1944 she was united in marriage to Herbert Neu. They made their home on the Neu farmstead one mile west and one mile north of Ashley. Leona and Herbert worked together to make their farm successful. Their farm op-



eration was diverse, raising beef cattle and chickens, milking cows, and growing wheat and other small grains. Along with raising a family, Leona was active as church financial secretary for nearly twenty years, a church council member, and a member of the district executive board of church women.

In 1967, Herbert and Leona moved into a new home built by Leona's father, Jacob, in Ashley. Their son Jarrold and wife Karen, moved onto the farm.

Leona was a member of Sunshine Homemakers club for 45 years and was the recipient of the first State Heart



award. She also baked and decorated cakes, making her first wedding cake in October of 1960. She made approximately 140 wedding cakes,

delivering as far as Moorhead, MN. Leona made her last wedding cake for her grandson, Daniel, in 1995. She also made many birthday and anniversary cakes during this time, delivering one as far as Wichita, KS for her sister-in-law.

Her skill as a seamstress was widely

known. She created over forty wedding gowns and many more bridesmaid dresses. Her skills produced many gowns and outfits worn

Leona also enjoys gardening and is an active member of both the Ashley Senior Citizens and Zion Lutheran Church. She enjoys socializing with friends and playing games and cards.
